Aurelius Augustine On Free Choice of the Will

For Saint Augustine, God is good and just in giving punishments to the wicked but is not the cause of the evil deeds (Hackett 1993). For him, every human has the “free choice of will” which presence can not be refuted. For free choice in everything is very obvious that it needs not to be explained, hence, it is an absurdity to deny it.
